I am excited about what this year has in store for all of us, and know that your children will have many exciting opportunities presented to them.



Last year over 800,000 people registered and took part in the drill. We will begin talking about this drill during morning announcements and teachers will be talking about the procedures with their students in class. For some of our students this will

Remember


We are encouraging families to use reusable containers when packing lunches so that they can be washed out and used again. Some classes have already
