### A Message from our Library...

A reminder to please save your gently used books for our first book binge at Willows. This is a great opportunity to encourage your child to keep reading over the summer break!

Gear up for new reading material by simply bringing in your child's gently used books (i.e. fiction, non-fiction, chapter books, picture books, comic books, etc...please note: board books and toddler books are too young for our students, but they can be donated to the 1000x5 book bin in the office). Students will be given one ticket for each book they bring in (up to 3 tickets per student, any books brought in over that amount will be donated to the Book Binge). In June your child's class will come to the library to cash in their tickets and shop for gently used books. The idea is that every student will receive at least one "new" book to keep.

Your child may drop books off to Madame Skinner at the library during class visits in **June**. Please clearly label any bags with your child's name and teacher/division to be sure they get credit for the books they bring in. #### Head Lice Awareness

Head lice are common in BC communities. Although they are a bother, head lice are not a health risk. Head lice spread quickly by close, head-to-head contact. Lice cannot live on furniture or carpet, and they cannot jump or fly. There may be few or no symptoms, but itching may occur. You can help by:

- · Checking your child's head with the wet combing method of detection once a week throughout the year.
- · Review the pamphlet <u>Wet Combing How to Get Rid of Head Lice</u>,
- · Encouraging your child to wear their hair tied back.
- · Treating if you notice live lice on your child's head.

• Reminding family and friends about the importance of routine head checks, using the wet combing method. For more information:
